A MESSAGE FROM WANJI, THE FOUNDER

PAAV is the result of a thought that came upon me in 2003, when an organization presented at Denver Seminary where I went to school, and asked the students to consider child sponsorship. I laughed to myself and wondered which of the children in my village in Kenya would be singled out as a likely candidate. I thought loudly "The whole village needs to be adopted!" and wrote down "Project Adopt a Village", a term that would later encompass my vision for Gitombo B, the small village where I grew up.

My father had always urged me to return to Gitombo and make a difference. It was only after his death in September 2008 that the vision crystallized and I began to see a way forward. This would be by "adopting" the community, empowering the people to ultimately transform the whole community. That kind of intentional community focus could only happen with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Our mission statement to offer Christ-centered education," clarifies that well. Through great faith the vision has come to fruition. With the help of donations from our US friends and our parents paying very discounted school fees, a lot has been achieved. Together we can achieve a lot!

PAAV-GITOMBO FAITH JOURNEY

In 2010, Wanjiru traveled from the US to Kenya and called the Gitombo Community together. The community agreed on a three-tier focus to break the cycle of poverty. These three were:

- 1. Water.
- 2. Education.
- 3. Microfinance

Wanjiru struggled with how to start working on the above projects but God is faithful! Ten years later, through PAAV all have been tackled. Wanjiru returned to Denver, where she worked for Christian Living Communities (CLC). She started sharing her vision with her friends, who were very supportive of this initiative.

Wanjiru gave all these plans to God and there were some obvious DIVINE APPOINTMENTS. To start with, a non-profit had to be formed and Wanjiru didn't know how to go about it. However, one day, while at a CLC management staff retreat, in Keystone, Colorado, Wanjiru met Andy Stewart. As they introduced themselves and talked, Wanjiru learned that besides his work, Andy had a ministry in Uganda and was in the process of forming a nonprofit. God was at work. Following subsequent meetings, Andy took in Wanjiru's PAAV vision under the new True Impact Ministries (TI) with one vital condition: that nothing would be done before Andy and his TI team visited Gitombo. They visited Gitombo on their way to Uganda. Their visit energized the community! Water and Education were again highlighted as priority needs. A sponsorship program was started for children to attend boarding schools. The program started with 10 children from very poor families.

With water being the first urgent need, Wanjiru and her friends started to raise support. Sufficient funds were raised and an 82O-foot borehole was done. In August of 2O13, the community celebrated the water with ice cream, a gift that was donated by Dorothy, a godly woman, in her final days of life, who wanted her last gift, on earth, to go to the Gitombo Water project.

After the joy of piped water, Wanjiru and the community proposed starting a school. When she went back to Denver, she shared with her friends the joy of the community water and the idea of starting a school in Gitombo. In 2014, Wanjiru started the process of forming a non-profit organization she named as per her initial vision: Project Adopt A Village. PAAV International Ministries was registered in Colorado as a non-profit organization. One day a friend called Wanjiru and told her that her deceased aunt had left her \$2,000.00 to be given to a charity of choice! That donation was used to put up the mabati shack which became the first school in Gitombo B. Upon completion, three children were available to attend and a teacher was hired. However, the teacher often left the children in class while she went out looking for other children to join the school because more children meant that she would be guaranteed a salary! Upon hearing this, Glea, one of Wanjiru's friends, and known in the community, said she would pay the teacher's salary! The teacher stayed in class and more children joined in. Thanks to Mr Kamau Gathu who superintended this school project, together with Wanjiru's family.

At the end of 2015, the school had 25 children ready to move to Grade 1, but it faced a significant challenge: there was no land for expansion. The school did not have permission to build on the county-owned property designated for a water project. The team that gathered at Mr. Wahinya Gathu's home in 2015 was tasked with finding a way to accommodate the 25 children.

Divine Intervention: God provided a solution where there seemed to be none! Remarkably, Mr. Kamau Gathu learned that a property on the western side of Gitombo B was for sale. This property included a large house that had been abandoned for many years. However, the asking price was astronomical, leading Wanjiru to initially dismiss the idea of purchasing it. The breakthrough came through her mother, who visited the property and encouraged Wanjiru to reconsider. She pointed to the house and said, "There is your school."

When the owner found out the property was intended for a school, he became excited and decided to sell the land specifically for this purpose, bypassing his assigned brokers. Wanjiru returned to Denver, trusting her family to manage the sale, though she wasn't sure how everything would work out. Back in Denver, she convened the PAAV Board, and they unanimously agreed to support the proposal—a significant step of faith! Fortunately, within a short time, the \$50,000 needed was raised, and renovations began. The projects were extensive and costly, taking considerable time. The community rallied together to clear and clean both the interior and exterior of the deserted house. God proved faithful. By January 2016, the school successfully relocated to the newly named SOMA House.

Over the years, various developments have taken place, including the digging of pit latrines, the construction of semi-permanent classrooms, activity rooms, storage facilities, and a concrete water storage tank for rainwater harvesting. New toilets were built, transitioning from mud-pit latrines to Asian-style water closets and urinals. Additional land was acquired, and teamwork flourished!

The school has grown significantly, hiring more teachers from other counties and the surrounding areas. It is now registered as PAAV-Gitombo Community Primary & Junior School, serving 185 children from Pre-primary to Grades 1-8, along with 25 sponsored children in secondary schools and colleges.

PAAV-GITOMBO, 2024

PAAV-Gitombo is a Christian school whose motto is "more than academics." PAAV has brought high quality Christ-centered education closer to the children of Gitombo while at the same time creating employment opportunities for many parents in our school and community

We started Junior school in 2022 when the school was officially registered in Kenya as PAAV-Gitombo Community Primary and Junior School.

The Junior School academic block, Imani House, was constructed with the help of donations from the US. That support has also made possible the construction and equipping of both the science and computer laboratories, a library, music and home science rooms.

All of our children have the opportunity to learn the Bible, Music, Drama, engage in Indoor Board Games, and Sports. Some of our children have been identified to be very good at chess, playing piano and the descant recorders.

Over the weekends, we provide Sunday School for the children, Bible Study for the youth and parents.

Baraka House, Dining & Community Room

Baraka House was constructed after a donation by Barbara from Ireland. Before then, the children ate outside. It was constructed next to the original owner's man cave "Thingira" which we converted into a kitchen. "Baraka" means "Blessing" in Swahili.

Initially, some children came to school with food while others had no breakfast and came to school hungry. God took care of that. While in the air on a Lufthansa flight, Wanjiru was seated next to a pastor in charge of distributing food to poverty-stricken areas in Kenya. They talked. Out of that divine encounter, the whole school enjoyed free lunch for two years! At the end of it, we put in place a Meal Program. Today the children get two meals a day. Through cow donations by two families in Denver and Frankfurt, the children can enjoy milk in their porridge.

Baraka House has been a blessing for all the children by giving them a new dining experience where they eat at the table and acquire social skills, through eating and praying together as a family.





Sunday School and Bible studies

Sunday school, staff Bible study, and meetings are held in Baraka House. The staff have their Bible study every Wednesday evening. Our teachers take turns teaching Sunday school.





Sports

The school children have sports every Friday afternoon. Our school field is about half a kilometer from the school compound.



On Saturdays, the school children and the community children come together for sports on the school field. This is a wonderful opportunity for the community children who would otherwise be playing on the road. This is unsafe but there was no other field in Gitombo. They play football and volleyball after which a teacher leads them in reading scripture, a hymn and prayer.



Our Staff

Uniforms

Our uniforms department is headed by two grandmothers. They make all the children's uniforms. Rachel sews while Miriam knits using donated machines. We buy the sports uniform but we hope to sew them at school in the future. Our children love their uniforms, it serves the critical role of equalizing them, regardless of background.

At present, these two grandmothers are training other younger staff members to learn tailoring and knitting. Recently, Shadrack, one of our sponsored students in college has come to do his attachment in the department. We thank God for the people who donated the sewing and

knitting machines.

Sponsorship Program

The sponsorship program that began in 2010 has helped about 25 children in the area to attend boarding schools and colleges in Kenya. Upon finishing secondary school the children are offered the opportunity to be in a 4-6 months Mentoring and Career Guidance Program at school, which we call the "PAAV Boot Camp". During this time these young people work in different departments at school. The bootcamp has helped them to be better people, disciplined, transitioning them from a sheltered life in boarding school to being independent before they are posted to different colleges. During this time, PAAV helps them apply for Government student loans and other financial aids. Thanks to James Macharia Kiarii who works tirelessly at this!

Currently, there are 11 students in various colleges in Kenya. Seven will be graduating next year (2025) with qualifications in business, Community development, plumbing, motor vehicle engineering, and fashion and design.

The students are encouraged to join the Youth With a Difference (YWAD) Bible study and Fellowship Group. The goal is for these young people to become good role models to our children both at school and in the community.

I am Joseph and I have many siblings. My father died when I was quite young and my mother had no way of educating all of us. I was one of the first children from Gitombo to be sponsored in 2010 in a good boarding school.

The Pillars Program

The Pillars program is an empowerment initiative aimed at improving the standards of living of the parents at our school. PAAV partnered with Get-Hope-Global, CO, an organization that provides faith-based business training programs to different countries. We use their training materials for training men and women in the pillars program. Through this program, the members are provided with microfinancing for small businesses.

The Pillars meet every Sunday afternoon for Bible Study. Currently, they are studying the Book of Exodus after they finished Genesis. Besides Wanjiru, Samuel the Head Teacher, has enjoyed the fellowship while teaching these men and women! The Small Business training is now taking place during the week and some staff members have joined. Through this program, PAAV is transforming families in the community.





Challenges and needs

Land & Construction

Land has always been a challenge. As the school grows, we continue to buy land whenever possible. Gitombo is densely populated. Land is typically inherited and subdivided among sons, who pass it down to their own sons. So, getting a parcel of land to purchase is itself a great opportunity.


Construction - As the school grows so does its need for new buildings.



Water

The school gets water from two wells and harvesting rainwater. A 40,000-liter concrete tank was built and other tanks donated in the last ten years.

We are still water challenged especially during the dry seasons. More water storage facilities are needed.



Other Needs

The school is dedicated to offering our learners the best education as per the CBC curriculum. To do this we need support getting textbooks, computers, sports equipment, laboratory equipment, musical instruments, drama props, and food for the learners.

"Hello, my name is Njoroge. I was born and grew up in Gitombo. I have 7 siblings. None of us were able to finish school due to a lack of school fees. An uncle helped me to become his apprentice in masonry. It was hard work as I had to wake up early and go long distances to make the day pay. Today, I look back and I am so happy that I kept at it. Later, I was supported to do a masonry course. Since graduation, I have worked in many places including Nairobi. When I was asked to come help renovate the house at PAAV, I was curious as to how that would turn into a school, since it had been a home with bathrooms, kitchens, and other small rooms! I am proud of PAAV for this great work and thankful for allowing me to work on the remodeling project. We have had to knock down walls, enlarge rooms, to make classrooms. I know every corner of this wonderful building!

I have also been amazed by the many changes on this property. Over the years I have been involved in most of PAAV's projects, being the lead contractor in the construction of both semi-permanent houses and permanent ones like Baraka, Bidii, and Imani Houses. At present, we are constructing a three-level building which will house classrooms, a Chapel, a Library, and offices. This construction is special to me in the sense that I have had 4 boys working under me. These are boys straight from boarding schools with little exposure or knowledge of the construction industry. I am so glad that I can mentor them under the PAAV Mentoring and Career Guidance "Boot Camp" Program. This has started us off on an Apprenticeship program for the future!

Being part of PAAV has changed me as a man, and has greatly benefited my family. I lead the Pillars Men Group. I have witnessed firsthand the positive impact of PAAV in the community especially through men. Meeting with young men has opened my eyes to the many challenges men face as fathers. PAAV has provided ways for us men to be transformed through small business training and Bible Study.

I enjoy our weekly Bible Study, which has strengthened my faith. This ministry has grown me into a position of leadership earning me lots of respect in the community too. I'm a father of three, with my youngest son in vocational school. My grandson attends PAAV-Gitombo. My prayer and hope for the future is having more godly families, and that no child lacks education due to financial challenges. Thank you to all of you who have supported this mission. I am a different man because of PAAV."

Vision For The Next <u>Ten Greater</u> Years

Senior School

Our first Junior school Grade 8 class will be graduating to Grade 9 in 2025. Junior School will transition to Senior School in 2026 to Grades 10–12. This will mean more land and additional construction.

Teacher's Housing

Building houses for teachers is essential for attracting and retaining qualified educators. In Gitombo B, teachers often struggle to find good quality housing, and a lack of accommodation can deter them from staying long-term. Providing housing would give teachers stability and encourage them to invest in the community, ultimately improving not only the quality of education, but of the community too!

Clinic/Dispensary

When a child or anyone else at school gets hurt, it takes time to travel to get them care. A clinic will take care of that. This service will also help the local residents.

Vocational/Apprenticeship/Skills Development

Most of our children may not pursue university education due to financial constraints and other factors. Doable vocational and apprenticeship programs would offer them practical skills in trades such as carpentry, tailoring, mechanics, or agriculture, leading to self-sustaining lives in the future.

Transition in Leadership

There is a great need to nurture new leadership to carry PAAV's vision forward. Therefore, We need to invest in leadership training as part of PAAV's transformative ministries in Kenya and beyond.

We look up to God for more land, buildings, food, books, Music and sports equipment for our growing school ministry.
